

PARSHAS VAYIKRA

7 Nisan 5785 | April 5, 2025

Parsha Summary

The book of Leviticus begins this week with details of the temple service, spiritual fitness of kohanim for service, and laws of tumah and taharah, ritual purity and impurity. The main types of offerings described in Parshas Vayikra, each indicative of a different mode of reconnecting with G-d are: the Olah, a wholly burnt offering, a Mincha, made of flour, a Shlamim, or peace offering, which includes the Korban Todah or thanksgiving offering; a Chatas or unintentional sin-offering, and an Asham, a penitential offering for certain types of transgressions.

In the times when there is no Temple standing in Yerushalayim, the eternal and undivided capital of Israel; we cannot bring the physical offerings, so we mention them daily in our prayers and reap the spiritual benefits. The underlying idea behind all these topics is Teshuva; returning and reconnecting with G-d.

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Not Shabbat Hagadol

But it will feel like it! The annual pre-Pesach Shabbat Hagadol talk will be this shabbat morning following Musaf. Since next week Shabbat is Erev Pesach, there's not much time to discuss Pesach preparations, so in these instances (stay tuned for the next one in 2045!) we advance the Shabbat Hagadol talk to this week.

Shabbat Hagadol (next week) takes its name from the haftorah read on that day, or because of the great miracles that began on the Shabbos before the Exodus, depending on your sources. Next week we'll read the haftorah from chapter 3 of Malachi which contains the verse "Behold! I send you Elijah the Prophet, before the Great and Awesome day of Hashem." That "Great" may be one source for the name of next shabbat.

Another possibility is that the Jewish people took lambs, which were an Egyptian deity believe it or don't, and kept them in our houses from Shabbat until midweek when the time for the Exodus came. Then we slaughtered them as the first Passover Offering in preparation for leaving Egypt. This negation of false gods was itself a great and noteworthy occasion.

So this week, we'll really start to get ourselves in the headspace of Pesach. If you haven't already arranged to sell your chometz (leavened products which may not be owned over Pesach), please take a moment to do that now with this link. Monday is the last full day to arrange that through KST.

Please review the Nachas bulletin which should have arrived in your mailbox by now, and the Shabbat Hagadol Drasha video when it's posted. There are many special things to put on your to-do list before next Friday night, April 11th, when your entire house must be ready for Pesach by the beginning of Shabbos, so you can begin the seder right away when Shabbat concludes Saturday night. Detailed guidelines are there for you, as well as on the COR and OU Pesach guides.

Don't forget to:

- --sell your chametz
- --as you shop, make sure products are labeled "Kosher for Passover" as sometimes the wrong products are on the Passover shelves.
- --Attend a siyum Thursday morning April 10 if you are a firstborn and don't wish to fast
- --search for chametz Thursday night April 10 and burn chametz Friday morning April 11
- --Prepare your kitchen, dining room, home, office if needed for Pesach by Friday 4/11
- --Feel welcome to get in touch with any questions!
- --mark your calendar for early services Shabbat 4/12, 7:30am start time, kiddush after.


