If you're behind on your electricity or natural gas bill and are worried that your service may be disconnected you may qualify for emergency financial help through the Low-income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP).

Take note: neither the OEB nor your local utility can offer you this help directly. You must go through one of the social agencies listed in the website.

Low-income customers can get up to \$500 in emergency assistance for their electricity bills (\$600 if your home is heated electrically) and \$500 for their natural gas bills.

York Region residents can get financial assistance for rent, mortgage payments, utilities and other housing costs through two programs.

1. The Housing Stability Program is for people who are already receiving Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) benefits.

<u>2.</u> <u>The Homelessness Prevention program</u> is for people who are not receiving other financial assistance.

The Homelessness Prevention Program provides one-time assistance to York Region residents with low and moderate income ("applicants") who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and are not receiving Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Program benefits.

York Region administers the Homelessness Prevention Program for those that live in the City of Markham, the Town of Richmond Hill and the City of Vaughan through Jewish Family and Child Services.

Through an application process those in need may receive assistance once every three years for the following:

- First and last month's rent.
- Rental arrears.
- Utility arrears.
- Utility security deposit.
- Utility reconnection fees.
- Moving costs.
- Assistance with mortgage payments (including mortgage arrears).
- Replacement costs for identification.
- Compensation for urgent medical needs.
- Landlord and tenant mediation.

Healthy Smiles Ontario is available to all low-income families in Ontario. Any family with income below the program's income thresholds can apply each year to receive children's dental coverage.

Healthy smiles Ontario – Children In Need Of Treatment (CINOT)

General information:

If you don't qualify for Healthy Smiles you can enrol in CINOT – <u>Children in Need Of Dental Treatment Program.</u>

The Children In Need Of Treatment (CINOT) program ensures that children and youth with urgent dental needs and no other access to care can receive treatment at no cost. CINOT is a catastrophic dental care program that is available to children aged 17 and younger.

Children must be screened by a dentist or dental hygienist.

To qualify for emergency/essential dental care, you must:

- Have a clinical need.
- Be able to show financial hardship. You will be asked some questions about how you or your family would be affected if you had to pay for dental treatment. For example, would you be able to pay household bills if you had to pay for dental treatment?
- Children receiving emergency and/or essential care are covered for 12 months from their date of enrollment.
- They must re-apply at the end of 12 months to determine if they're still eligible.

You can contact the nearest dental clinic for appropriate screening. Please visit the city website, below for clinic locations.

You qualify for the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) program when you turn 65 years old.

Some of you will qualify before you reach that age because you're:

- living in a:
 - o long-term care home
 - o home for special care
 - Community Home for Opportunity
- 24 years of age or younger and not covered by a private insurance plan
- receiving professional home and community care services
- receiving benefits from Ontario Works or Ontario Disability Support Program
- enrolled in the Trillium Drug Program

For seniors (people age 65 and older) we will send you a letter about three months before your 65th birthday to let you know you will automatically join the Ontario Drug Benefit program on the first day of the month after you turn 65 years old.

The Old Age Security (OAS) program

The Old Age Security (OAS) program is the Government of Canada's largest pension program. It is funded out of the general tax revenues of the Government of Canada. This means that you do not pay into it directly.

The OAS pension is a monthly payment available to seniors aged 65 and older who meet the Canadian legal status and residence requirements. You may need to apply to receive it. In addition to the OAS pension, there are three types of OAS benefits:

Low-Income Seniors Co-Payment Drug Program

Starting August 1, 2016, more than 170,000 seniors will be newly eligible for the low-income Seniors Co-Payment program under the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) Program.

You may be eligible to enrol in the Seniors Co-Payment Program if you are:

- A single senior with an income of less than or equal to \$19,300; or
- A senior couple with a combined income of less than or equal to \$32,300.

Seniors enrolled in the Seniors Co-Payment Program pay no annual deductible and a co-payment of up to \$2 for each prescription. As a result, they will save approximately \$130 on average per year in out-of-pocket drug costs.

How to Apply for the Seniors Co-Payment Program?

Complete a Co-payment Application for Seniors form and send it to the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. There are four ways for seniors to access an application for the Seniors Co-Payment Program:

Higher education grants

Canada Learning Bond (CLB)

The Canada Learning Bond (CLB) is money that the Government adds to a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) for children from low-income families.

How much does a child receive?

The Government of Canada contributes up to \$2,000 to an RESP for an eligible child. This includes:

\$500 for the first year of eligibility

\$100 each year the child continues to be eligible (up to and including the benefit year in which they turn 15)
